National Children's Chiefs Commission Workplan and Budget for Long-Term Reform of the FNCFS Program

Workplan: January 1, 2025 - March 31, 2026

The First Nations-in-Assembly established the National Children's Chiefs Commission via AFN Resolution 60/2024, and directed the Commission to work openly and transparently to provide strategic direction and oversight of negotiations to reform the FNCFS program and Jordan's Principle. The current workplan and budget anticipate a 4-stage approach to reach an agreement on long-term reform of the FNCFS program¹:

- 1. Establish the Commission
- 2. Establish the Commission's negotiating positions
- 3. Negotiate a long-term reform agreement
- 4. Ratify a long-term reform agreement

The steps required to establish the Commission are delineated in Table 1 below.

The Commission will consult with the NAC, the EAC, and regional leadership and experts to develop draft negotiation positions that are aligned with the direction provided by First Nations-in-Assembly and AFN Resolution 61/2024 in particular. The Commission will bring draft positions to regional consultation sessions (held virtually) and will subsequently refine the positions based on input from the regions. The Commission will bring the refined positions to regional validation sessions (held virtually) to ensure that any amendments reflect regional input, and will make further refinements based on further input from the regions. These steps are delineated in Table 2 below.

The Commission's negotiation team will negotiate with Canada and the other Parties to reach an agreement on long-term reform of the FNCFS program. The negotiating team's positions will be guided by the work produced and validated in Stage #2. The negotiating will consult with the Commission if and when amendments to those positions become necessary. Once the parties reach a tentative agreement, the Commission will convene inperson consultation sessions within each region to review the agreement and seek input on the details. Most regions will convene multiple sub-regional sessions to accommodate geographic and cultural diversity. It is anticipated that further negotiations may be required to allow for amendments based on input from the sub-regional consultation sessions. This work is described in Table 3 below.

Once the negotiations are complete, the Commission will distribute the draft agreement to First Nations and host a series of national information sessions (held virtually) to answer


questions about the agreement. After a period of review, First Nations-in-Assembly will vote to ratify or reject the draft agreement. This work is described in Table 4 below.

Budget: January 1, 2025 - March 31, 2026

For the period beginning January 1, 2025 and ending March 31, 2026, the Commission's total budget to implement the workplan described above is **\$8,880,625.00**. This budget consists of four components: regional costs, secretariat support, negotiation team and legal costs.

1. Regional Costs: \$5,575,625.00

The regional costs include: one technical advisor per region; travel to quarterly in-person Commission meetings; and subregional in-person consultation sessions. The details for regional costs are provided in Table 5 below.

2. Secretariat Support: \$455,000.00

Secretariat support includes a manager, finance manager and policy analyst who: schedule and send invitations to all virtual meetings; coordinate in-person meetings; plan agendas and take minutes; track and follow up on all action items; manage correspondence and communications; manage and disseminate documents (including translation); coordinate the work of the technical advisors, negotiating team and legal counsel; and manage budgets and payables. The details for secretariat costs are provided in Table 6 below.

3. Negotiation Team: \$1,954,000.00

The negotiation team will consist of five members appointed by the Commission, plus the Chair of the Commission. For budgeting purposes, it is anticipated that the negotiators will travel on a weekly basis to meet in-person during active negotiations.
